THE SECRET GARDENS OF THE SEA

Rhythm in Bronze (RiB) is thrilled to present a unique musical journey into the seldom-explored and little-known realm of Malaysia's endangered seagrass meadows.

Clumping together in shallow coastal waters, seagrass form meadows that represent a fascinating ecosystem teeming with turtles, dugongs, seahorses, and a myriad other species - endangered and not. So rich in biodiversity, these microcosms are also vital for sustaining the livelihoods and well-being of coastal communities. Yet, they are among marine life's unsung heroes and face rapid destruction. Every hour, the equivalent of two football fields of seagrass is lost around the world due to natural causes as well as human activity.

Our aim, through this concert, is to bring greater awareness and appreciation of the importance of seagrass. Via an intersection of arts and the environment, we present original gamelan pieces composed by Malaysian artistes who were invited to immerse themselves in seagrass habitats. Each piece is a provocative metaphor of the emotions and sentiments awoken by our undulating seagrass meadows and the communities that rely on them.

The Secret Gardens of the Sea continues in the tradition that began with our Gamelan Theatre concert, Arus Gangsa - that of channelling the power of music towards supporting environmental preservation. As human activity increasingly destroys our environment and natural habitats, we seek to inspire change. With Arus Gangsa, we brought to surface the broad theme of water. Now, we take the dialogue deeper into a specific marine ecosystem.

The concert is integral to our Artistic Director and Music Director Dr. Jillian Ooi's Pew Marine Fellowship project, titled "What Lies Beneath: Revealing the Secret Lives of Seagrass Roots and the Hidden Charisma of Seagrass Habitats." Her project, which began in 2022, has four main objectives. The first three explore the ecology of seagrass roots and the development of transplant anchoring devices; the fourth leverages culture and the arts to bring the seagrass narrative to a wider audience.

As the Pew Marine Fellowship finances scientific research, we turned to Cendana's Dana Kandungan Digital (DKD) Industri Muzik to fund Jillian's fourth objective. In addition to our live performances, we are creating a digital documentary of our journey. We have also organised a post-performance conference on Augsut 29, providing a platform for diverse stakeholders to share key learnings and foster actionable insights for the protection of seagrass ecosystems.

Thank you for joining us on this extraordinary journey as we dive into the mystique of seagrass meadows and the communities they sustain. We hope you enjoy their story as narrated through the transcendent language of music.







RHYTHM IN BRONZE: MAKING WAVES IN THE COMMUNITY

Since 1997, RiB has been devoted to the preservation of Malaysia's music heritage, ensuring future generations will appreciate, cherish and become part of this cultural legacy. At the core of RiB's work is contemporary Malay gamelan, a blend of traditional and modern tones that encapsulates the spirit of a rapidly developing nation. Through innovative compositions and collaboration with accomplished local and international musicians, RiB has been able to showcase this eclectic art form in academic and world-music circles.

As the group evolved, it has become increasingly drawn towards an even broader mission. From the focal point of music preservation, it is now also using music to drive environmental conservation.

This new journey began in 2014 with Arus Gangsa, a concert that sparked awareness about how vital water is to all forms of life. With The Secret Gardens of the Sea, audiences are invited to ride the waves of music to the wondrous underwater world.



WHY SEAGRASS **MATTTERS**

Seagrass is something of an unsung hero in our marine world. It's not as glamorous as colourful coral or as iconic as massive dugongs, but it plays a crucial role in the health of our oceans! Let's dive a little deeper (pun intended) into why these underwater gardens are so important:

- **Promoting biodiversity:** Think of seagrass beds as bustling underwater cities. They provide shelter as well as breeding and feeding grounds for a variety of marine life, from tiny seahorses to graceful dugongs. Without these meadows, many marine species would not survive.
- Natural protectors: Seagrass meadows act like nature's shock absorbers. During storms, they help dampen the force of the waves, protect our coasts and prevent erosion. They're like the bodyguards of the coastline!
- Climate change warriors: Believe it or not, seagrass is a heavyweight when it comes to carbon capture and storage. These meadows can store up to twice as much carbon per unit area as forests on land. So not only do they keep our oceans alive, they also help to combat climate change!
- **Economic powerhouses:** Many local communities rely on the health of seagrass meadows for their livelihoods, whether through fishing, tourism or other sea-related activities. Protecting seagrass means securing a stable income and food source for countless people around the world.
- Nature's purifiers: Seagrass beds help improve water quality. They act like filters, retaining sediment and absorbing many pollutants from the water. If you're swimming on a beach in crystal clear water, it's quite possible that the seagrass has played its part.

With Seruan Setu, we seek to shine a light on the wonders of seagrass. It's not just about the music or the performance, but about understanding and appreciating the delicate balance of nature and the role we all play in it. We hope you'll join us on this melodious journey of discovery and appreciation.

Meet Setu (Enhalus acoroides), a titan of the tropical seagrass world. Boasting the title of the largest tropical seagrass species, Setu isn't just about size; it's a testament to nature's wonders beneath the waves. With long, ribbon-like leaves that stretched up to 1.5m, anchored by robust root systems, this seagrass stands as a vital part of marine ecosystems, providing shelter and nourishment for countless marine species. But more than its role in marine life, the majestic presence of Setu in our waters is a reminder of the intricate beauty and essential functions that seagrass meadows bring to our oceans.





KELAB ALAMI AND PASAR PENDEKAR LAUT - GUIDING PROGRESS THROUGH NATURE

Collaborating Partners

In the heart of Mukim Tanjung Kupang, there is a group that sets sail in a different way, pursuing a course of development that is in harmony with the rhythms of nature, not against it. This group of visionaries calls itself Kelab Alami, a local initiative founded in 2008 as an environmental education club. In 2014, like a river adapting to the landscape, its goal shifted to focus on and help manage increasing development around them.

Imagine a vibrant community that weaves together the threads of marine habitat and cultural heritage exploration, environmental education, sustainable ecotourism and community entrepreneurship. This is precisely the mission of Kelab Alami. They also work with over 40 fishermen under the banner of Pasar Pendekar Laut (Sea Warriors Market). This unique programme is making waves as the fishermen are paid twice as much as other operators to ensure they bring in quality catches that don't harm the ecosystem.

More than a marketplace, Pasar Pendekar Laut's Market is an educational centre and a champion of fair trade. Here, customers learn about the seasonality of seafood and the importance of paying a fair price for quality seafood. Fishermen registered with MyKomuniti Perikanan (MyKP) Pendekar Laut aren't only part of the market, but also part of a larger movement by releasing endangered species caught accidentally and contributing to ongoing research.

Kelab Alami isn't just about the sea, though; they have widened their net further. They offer ecotourism initiatives and employ local fishermen as boat captains, and young people as nature guides. Visitors can explore seagrass beds, the fascinating island of Pulau Merambong and coastal mangrove forests while being educated about the environment and local heritage.

And if the adventures work up an appetite, guests can sample local dishes at Warung Citarasa Tg Kupang, an enterprise that not only tickles the taste buds but also preserves cooking traditions and provides employment opportunities for local women.

Education continues to be the focus of Kelab Alami, with programmes aimed at training the new generation of scientists and habitat experts. Their Citizen Science initiative at Shattuck-St. Mary's-Forest City International School encourages the school community to participate in natural heritage documentation, including an impactful mangrove rescue and replanting project. In the midst of this busy development, Kelab Alami is a beacon leading the community towards a sustainable future, one initiative at a time. ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

The first time I worked with Rhythm in Bronze was in 2005 when Chee Sek Thim, Lim How Ngean and I were asked to jump in to take over rehearsals of Monkey Business because the late Krishen Jit, the actual director, had fallen seriously ill. It was Rhythm in Bronze's first foray into what has become its Gamelan Theatre series, where established theatre directors, choreographers, set, costume and lighting designers collaborate on contemporary gamelan performances integrated with theatre. While in one sense it was taking gamelan music back to its roots, with a gamelan troupe accompanying various forms of traditional Southeast Asian theatre and performance, Rhythm in Bronze's Gamelan Series has always been innovative, pushing boundaries and taking contemporary gamelan performance to new heights.

In the 18 years since Monkey Business, Sharmini and Jillian invited me on several occasions to direct one of their productions, but somehow our schedules never synched. That is until end 2022 when they approached me for Seruan Setu (The Call of the Setu). It was perfect timing as I was also looking for a post-Covid theatre project to work on. They explained how this would be the first time Jillian would be integrating her expertise as a marine biologist with her role as musical director of Rhythm in Bronze.

The objective is to create awareness about seagrass. With scant knowledge of seagrass, I was apprehensive. I had also never directed anything like this before – part documentary, part gamelan concert - I doubt many theatre directors have. However, I was intrigued by the prospect of working out of my comfort zone. I told myself to treat it like a science experiment to discover if the worlds of marine science and gamelan can be brought together to impart a very important message.

The project started in February 2023 when a group of composers, musicians, choreographers, photographers, videographers and myself went down to Tanjung Kupang, Johor for a four-day Immersive Lab. We experienced and learnt about the seagrass meadows and mangrove swamps, and were introduced to the communities whose livelihoods

depend on seagrass. Dr Serina, the founder of Kelab Alami, and her husband Lan, the founder of the Pendekar Laut Pasar Sungai Pendas, a cooperative of local Johor fisherman, hosted us. A smaller team went back in July to shoot more footage of the seagrass meadows and interviews with members of the local communities to use as part of the diverse tapestry which makes up the unique theatrical and musical performance which is Seruan Setu. Thank you to all the pendekar laut and local residents who came forward to support this project, and share their lives with us. Special thanks to Lan, the original pendekar laut, and Dr Serina for your dedication and passion for making a difference.

When we returned to KL after the first trip, we needed to form a coherent roadmap to guide us towards creating this unique piece of theatre. We brought in Mark Teh, whose talent in creating powerful stagings of documentary theatre, like the recent A Notional History, is undeniable. The series of mapping workshops he facilitated was invaluable - we can't thank him enough for this.

Seruan Setu has been a truly collaborative work involving music composers, documentary footage, animation, photography, choreography, lighting, sound, projection, set and costume design, and makeup. A big thank you to all the collaborators, Adilah, Faliq, Umar, Jyotsna, Sayyid, Khairi, Aida, Mac, Danny, Raja Malek, Affendi, the musicians, singers, dancers, animators, my assistant director, Reuben, Bebe and her stage management team. I am sorry I am unable to name everyone but thank you all the same for answering the call of the seagrass and for your contributions to this project. To the audience, thank you for your support; I hope all these elements have come together to give you an entertaining and informative experience.

Finally, my immense gratitude to Jillian and Sharmini for inviting me to direct Seruan Setu. It has been a truly enriching and meaningful experience. I did not expect to still have so much learn about the planet in my 60th year on it. Now I know how essential seagrass is to the survival of our oceans. I have discovered a new unsung hero. Thank you.

MUSIC DIRECTOR



My first encounter with seagrass was 18 years ago in the Johor River. Our team from Universiti Malaya was searching for dugongs to confirm if they were still present in Johor. We did find them and were overjoyed to catch glimpses of this elusive animal. But I found myself drawn more to their habitat - the lush seagrass meadows that cloak our shores in shades of green.

Returning to those same meadows last year, we found them looking the worse for wear. Villagers say the dugongs that used to populate this estuary are now rarely seen. One headman asked for help to revive their ailing seagrass meadow so that he may relive his childhood memories of thriving fish populations in these areas. One villager asked, "Why do scientists only study something when it is gone?" I had no answer.

But what I do have are Rhythm in Bronze and gamelan. Seruan Setu was created to tell these seagrass stories on a stage instead of a lecture podium, so that we may reach more people better and faster.

We began this project with a four-day immersive experience in Mukim Tanjung Kupang, Johor, so that our creative and production team could experience seagrass for themselves. My sincere thanks to Dr Serina Rahman, Shalan Jum'at, Kelab Alami and the abang nelayan of Pasar Pendekar Laut, for hosting us so warmly and willingly. You have a special place in our hearts.

Sharmini, thank you for believing in this project right from the start. For all those times you pretended to confuse seagrass and seaweeds, I know it was just to see my face dissolve into despair. I am grateful for this partnership and will continue to talk to you about seagrass...at least until the sea cows come home!

My deepest thanks to our musicians and performers who surrendered themselves to the world of seagrass. Seruan Setu would not have been possible without their talent and dedication. To our composers— Adilah, Falig, Gareth, Irena, Jyotsna, Sayyid and Umar—thank you for giving seagrass a voice. Colleen Wong, thank you for steadily driving and guiding the vocal sections.

Zahim, thank you for sharing this journey with us. It has been gratifying to hear you spouting seagrass facts off the top of your head, faster and better than scientists. Seruan Setu is an experiment in bridging the arts and sciences. We embark on this experiment with open hearts, not knowing if it will succeed. What I do know is that many in our cast and crew have become fervent champions of seagrass. May our music envelop you in the shimmering resonance of the gamelan that we love, awaken your senses, and instil a profound connection with the enchanting world of seagrass.



You're taken on a journey and see the vibrant ecosystem through the eyes of the narrator, who illuminates the symbiotic ballet between the goby fish, shrimps, sea cucumbers and myriad other creatures among the seagrass. The symbiotic existence of the community of creatures, reflected in the intertwined melodies of the gamelan, reflects a world that is in harmony.

But problems lurk. The encroachment of human development threatens this underwater utopia. the serenity of the meadow is disrupted by panic and fear, and a once vibrant haven is now gasping for breath.

The narrative leaves you contemplating. Will this underwater community rise from the ruins, or will it fade into a forgotten memory, a lost dream of what once was? It's a poignant reminder of the fragility of these ecosystems and highlights the urgent need to protect them for future generations.

Pulang is inspired by the serene vision of a sea turtle meandering through a lush underwater meadow. But behind this serene image lies a disturbing reality: the precious seagrass habitat that once teemed with life is now under threat. This truth triggers a storm of emotion - fear, grief - at the loss suffered by countless sea creatures.

It is a sensitive tribute to the displaced who long for their once thriving homeland. The melody paints an aural picture of the lost splendour of the meadow and captures the soothing sway of the seagrass in a 3/4 rhythm. Each instrument embodies a vital element of the ecosystem, reminding us of the delicate balance that has maintained this underwater oasis.

As the piece progresses, the interwoven rhythms intensify, expressing growing outrage at the lost homeland. Pulang is an emotional tapestry whose musical threads are coloured in shades of brown and red to reflect anger and pain, but are also interspersed with gentle stripes of light blue and green that provide moments of tender, poignant comfort.



A majestic journey of water, this piece begins with a dance of raindrops falling from brooding clouds. The tempo increases and turns into a passionate downpour that fills streams, winds around trees and tumbles over rocks.

Streams intertwine, one with another, creating a great symphony of nature. Eventually, this symphony slows down and the water comes to rest as it flows into open lakes and vast seas.

Imagine this breathtaking landscape - from the rain gently kissing the leaves of the forest, to babbling brooks, to the calm waters. The melody tells of the joyous journey of water, tumbling and calling out happily, "I am coming!" And then, in a gentle sigh of contentment, it whispers, "I am home." This is the rhythmic cycle of water, its ceaseless, exultant journey from sky to sea and back again.

9. Lengkung Hampa

Music and Lyrics by: Muhammad Sayyid Shafiee Singer: Maryann Magdalena Linnis

Lengkung Hampa is a symphony of resilience, hope and healing - life as a musical theme that makes its way through interruptions only to emerge strengthened and echoing a deeper melody.

Inspired by the tenacity of endangered seagrasses, the main theme is a minimal melody that reflects the marine plant's subtle but vital role in our ecosystem. Then come the contrasting sections - bold, grand and resonant - a drastic depiction of destructive forces such as land reclamation, pollution and climate change.

Now imagine the piece as a patchwork of segments. They seem unconnected, providing the flexibility for a journey of performances not confined to a straight path. But a thin thread of minimalist melody weaves them all together, subtly connecting the structure.

Lengkung Hampa teases out our frustrations with elements that intrude on the main theme, while presenting an organised, moving performance. Symbolising the dent of a gamelan instrument that makes the sound resonate, "lengkung" carries the message to all of us - we can and must stand tall amidst life's interruptions.



Saat Akhir (or 'Last Second') is an intricate tapestry woven from the colours of unique personalities. New Zealand-born composer Gareth Farr designed this masterpiece especially for Rhythm In Bronze to capture the individuality of each member and show how the interactions of all blend into a harmonious ensemble.

More than a demonstration of Rhythm In Bronze's skillful Balinese gamelan technique, Saat Akhir is a love letter, a commitment to the dynamic yet warm spirit of the group. Beyond that, it's a compelling call to action.

The performance embodies the urgency of preserving seagrass. It emphasises the ticking clock and makes it clear that now is the 'last minute' to act before our actions lead to irreversible damage. This composition urges us not to wait until the consequences become insurmountable. It's a tribute to unity and diversity and an urgent reminder of our responsibility to the earth.






